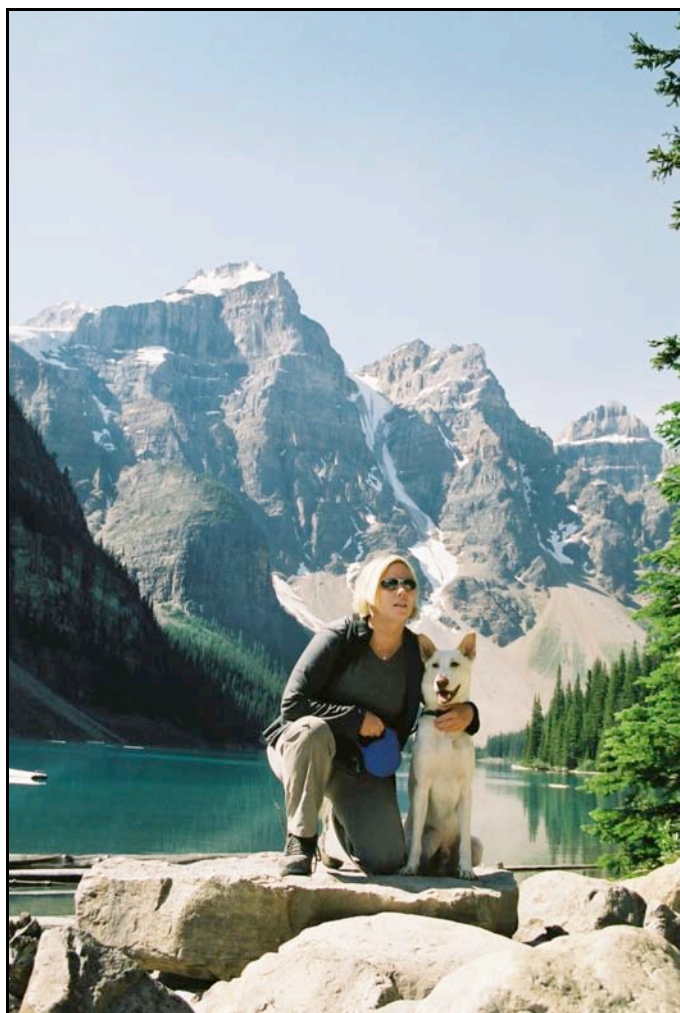

Health Clearances:

Health Clearances are available online at the OFA web site (www.offa.org). Full health clearances are also available for some Canaan Dogs on the CHIC (Canine Health Information Center) website, at <http://www.caninehealthinfo.org>. The Canine Health Information Center is a centralized canine health database jointly sponsored by the AKC/Canine Health Foundation (AKC/CHF) and the Orthopedic Foundation for Animals. CHIC requirements are customized to the needs of each breed, as determined by the parent club. Health clearances for related dogs can be obtained from both websites, allowing breeders to research both the depth and breadth of the health pedigrees.

CHIC Goals:

- * To work with parent clubs in the identification of health issues for which a central information system should be established.
- * To establish and maintain a central health information system in a manner that will support research into canine disease and provide health information to owners and breeders.
- * To establish scientifically valid diagnostic criteria for the acceptance of information into the database.
- * To base the availability of information on individually identified dogs at the consent of the owner.

Why you should teach your dog to track

In Tracking, we acknowledge the dog's natural scenting abilities by training the dog to follow a track scent and find an article at the end of the track. The age of the dog makes little difference in its tracking ability. With a Springer Spaniel three months is a great time to start.

In training you dog for tracking, you will develop a very close bond with your dog, for in tracking the dog is the boss and you must learn to read and understand what he telling you.

In the Los Angeles Daily Journal in 1990, there was an article titled "*Dogs Sniff Out Arsonists and Find Accelerant*". In this article, the trainers were quoted as saying that a dog's sense of smell is 100 times better than man's. With good reason: humans have 5 million cells devoted to the sense of smell. Dogs have 220 million.

The sport of tracking has really grown in popularity in the last 20 years. Tracking is a non-competitive sport – you either pass or fail. Unlike many activities, everyone at the trial really wants your dog to pass. There is a great camaraderie among the participants.

A misconception is that you have to live in the country – in 1995 a new tracking title wa added – the Variable Surface tracking title, which is judged on parking lots, industrial parks, and many urban areas. As of this writing, there are only 16 dogs in the country who have earned a VST titles, and two of them are Springers!

It's nice if your dog likes to retrieve, but it is not necessary that they retrieve the glove at the end of the track so long as they indicate that they have found it – they can sit on it, lay down on it, lift their leg on it, and in some cases have even swallowed it!

In training for tracking, we start with straight-line tracks that become longer and longer. When we feel that the dog is getting the idea, we then introduce turns. Longer and longer tracks are then put in, and then we start aging them.

Time schedule: it is quite conceivable that you could get a dog ready for its beginning tracking title in 3 to 5 months.

Certification: In order to enter a tracking trial due to the limited number of entries in the trial, you must get your dog certified by a licensed judge like myself. If your dog certifies, the judge will give you a written statement that you must submit with your entry form.

On the TD level, the track in 440 to 500 yards long. The track must be aged 30 minutes to 2 hours. There will be 3 to 5 turns, and you will find two flags – one to show you where to start and one to give you the direction of the track.

On the TDX level, the track is considerably more difficult – 800 to 1000 yards, 3 to 5 hours old, and only one flag marking the start with no other flag giving you direction. There will be at least two obstacles, and two cross-tracks made by two people, and 4 articles to find.

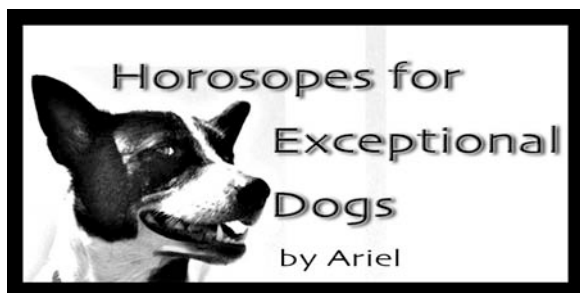
On VST, the track will be from 500 to 800 yards, 3 to 5 hours old, and only one flag marking the start, and the dog must find 4 articles. Many different surfaces will be used: sand blacktop, concrete, bare dirt, wood, etc.

Many tracking dogs have been called upon to work with search teams, serving communities when called upon to help locate children who have wandered or to find elderly people who have become confused and lost.

Tracking is a great sport – good exercise for the dog and the handler!

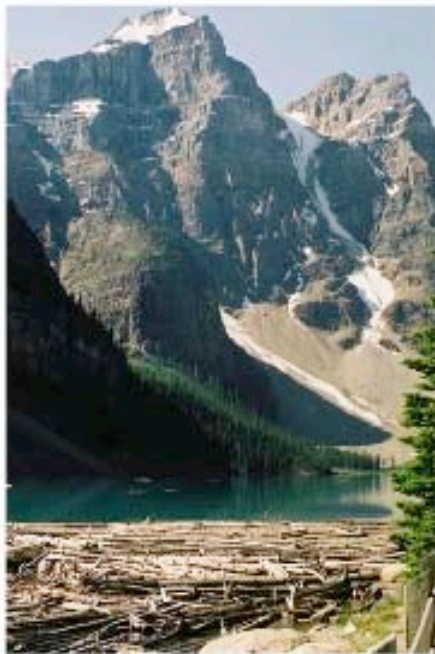
More Hiking

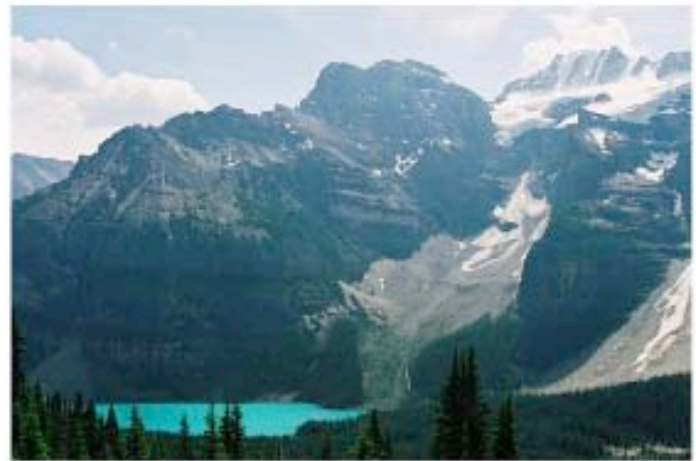
